Labor of Love

On May 25th of this past year, many of us loaded up Paul Stewart's van and took a number of household items to Ascentria in Worcester to aid Syrian refugee families in their resettlement in the United States. Ascentria's mission is: To break the cycle of poverty, and build thriving communities where everyone has the chance to achieve their full potential, regardless of background or disadvantage. They not only help refugee families resettle through their New Americans' Program, they also have an Unaccompanied Refugee Minors Program (URM)

Ascentria is the only program in New England that exclusively assists refugee and migrating youth. The program is responsible for refugee, asylee and trafficked young people under the age of 18 who are in the U.S. with no parent or guardian. They have placed more than 400 unaccompanied minors with foster families in Massachusetts.

This year the Worcester Ascentria program has a total of 68 high school students, 64 returning and 4 entering from junior high. These youth receive not only foster care placement, but educational support, MA Health, a quarterly clothing stipend, holiday and birthday stipends, case management which includes legal and mental health services, and much else that they need to thrive, perhaps most importantly compassion.

The young people in this program have come to the United States unaccompanied by any adult or guardian, arriving primarily from refugee camps in Asia and Africa and/or the city streets of Central America and Mexico. They have experienced interruptions in their education as a result of displacement caused by war, persecution, famine, poverty, civil strife, abandonment or neglect. Some had never attended school prior to their arrival to the United States. Despite this, more than 81% of the more than 600 minors who have been in the program have earned their high school diploma or GED. This is above the national average. The majority of these young people go on to study at community colleges or universities. In Massachusetts alone, there were 30 high school graduates and 28 went to a community college or university.

We at The Meeting House on Nantucket have agreed to participate in helping these youth in their return and continuation in high school by donating the needed items listed below. Three of the youth specifically that Ascentria asked we offer our support and prayers to are: Juan from Honduras, Kuya from Eritrea and Vishnu from Nepal.

On October 12th, we will bring what we collect to Ascentria in Worcester and meet with our partners there, leaving on the 7:45 Hyline Ferry and returning on the 5pm Steamship fast ferry.

Please join us in this 7th Principle Project Action as we continue our work to make a difference in our own lives and the lives of others. Items needed:

Re-Energizing Our Commitment to RE

One of the goals currently under discussion by our church community is "to make a firm commitment to Lifelong Religious Exploration (RE)." Some background about the RE program might be beneficial to review, given the number of friends and members relatively new to the congregation.

As has been the case with congregations of all denominations both on and off island, our RE (or Sunday School, as it's called in some churches) program has had its peaks and valleys. During Rev. Ted Anderson's tenure as minister the overall church membership numbers were at their highest and, not surprisingly, enrollment in the RE program for children was also significant. As ministerial transitions have occurred, the congregation has aged and attitudes about regular Sunday church service attendance have changed, so has the RE program at the Meeting House.

Over the past 15 years or so the program has expanded to encompass adult educational offerings that take place at times other than Sunday morning when the traditional children's RE program occurs. The adult program received special emphasis during the ministries of Jennifer Brooks and interim David Horst. Our current minister, Rev. Linda Simmons, with her wealth of experience in education and training, has taken us to an even higher plane with adult programs that have attracted not only members and friends within the congregation but also many from the community-at-large.

As we consider the goal of making a firm commitment to RE, it's important for us to realize that five years ago we as a congregation faced the reality that we were not being as financially prudent and responsible as we needed to be for a membership our size. We were spending down our endowment at an alarming rate and our expenditures were far out on sync with our income. Difficult decisions had to be made with drastic spending cuts in the annual budget, including our RE program. Though painful, the budget reduction was necessary for us to protect our endowment for future generations and also in order for us to be able to fund a full-time minister rather than a part-time position. The cuts meant that we had to move to more of a volunteer RE program involving qualified members for the children's program. Though well meaning, that approach was not sustainable with our limited pool of teachers and their other competing volunteer commitments within the church. Fortunately, we were blessed with Jen Dunbar joining us as a paid children's RE teacher. During her tenure, she was a valuable member of our staff and much loved by the children and families within our congregation. We are grateful for her contributions to the program.

Now we begin a new chapter in our RE program as we consider a firm commitment to this important aspect of ministry to all ages within our congregation. How will this renewed commitment be funded? How will it be structured to build a sustainable program for children, youth and adults? What expectations do families and RE participants of all ages have of our RE program moving forward? These and other questions need YOUR input.
