Befriending Ourselves by Rev. Linda Simmons

Watching Neci come down the gang plank of the ferry in her red dress and high heeled sandals, I did not see a middle aged woman with my middle aged eyes. Embracing on Straight Wharf, arms strong around each other, we became the women we were when we met, twenty something, adventurous, bubbling with ideas and certainty, in love with everything.

Neci was here for three days. Amazing to me how little time is needed for 30 years to fall away and the life and wonder of youth to fill my bones. Neci and I walked the beaches in the sun and laughed and talked all night and held hands and marveled at the darkness and vulnerability roaming the night beach in the rain.

Once, feeling overcome with life, we rolled in the sand and giggled. Later that day sitting in a meeting, I reached up to fix my hair and was surprised to feel sand on my scalp, like finding school papers written in elementary school and no longer recognizing the handwriting.

We are so many selves, all mixed up together. Different relationships bring different aspects of who we are to the fore. The sand in my hair reminded me that we only exist in relation to one another.

We are blessed to be in covenantal community with each other, to have the courage to be seen as all of who we are, to have the courage to be known. We are blessed to live in relationship to a noble religious history of justice, human rights, access and dignity for all, and to be part of a religious history that failed in all of these ways at different times but never let that failure be the final word. We as Unitarian Universalists have always rolled up our sleeves and kept moving toward awakening.

All of these relationships keep us whole and allow us to not only roll down sand hills but to stand strong in the face of injustice, learning to dance with all of who we are.

* Nantucket is full of common pathways, some known by many, others known only by a few. Our Meeting House brings us together, traveling over many pathways, some common, some not, as we learn to walk with each other even when the ways are unfamiliar and unmarked.

MID-YEAR STATE OF THE CONGREGATION REPORT

I am delighted to tell you that the state of our congregation is very good. We have a wonderful new, settled minister, the Reverend Linda Simmons, who was installed almost a year ago to the day, and I think I speak for all of us in saying how thrilled we are to have her here. Her range of talents is remarkable—she gives deeply inspiring sermons, she is active in forging community bonds, she speaks with sincerity and integrity on issues of social justice facing our island and the larger world, and she has a soothing, healing touch in matters of pastoral care. She is incredibly dedicated to her work as a minister. She has been all we hoped and dreamed for, and more.

In the past year we have gained nine new members, and equally as important, for the first time in many years, we have been able to establish a balanced operating budget—a budget that does not require the withdrawal of funds from the principal of our endowment. The outlook on that front is rosy, as pledges continue to grow and as the fruits of our labor will start to show up, little by little, in the gradual return to this building being a vibrant home for community events and for weddings.

While we have arrived at a good place as a congregation, I would suggest that much work remains to be done. Much of our success has rested on the shoulders of some outstanding leaders over the past three or four years who gave us their all. We now need to broaden our shoulders, as it were. We need to keep cultivating new leaders; we need members of the congregation to step forward. We also need to broaden our financial support from everyone. And we need to start a discussion, among all members of our congregation, about our mission. What do we value? How do we see ourselves, as spiritual beings and as members of a committed group of UUs? Over the next year, the Board, with the active leadership of Rev. Linda, will work to get this positive process of self-reflection started.

The Board is there to work with and to support our minister, to make sure the church finances are in order, to assist the work of various committees, to set priorities for the year, and to take on various initiatives. By way of example, for this year the Board set the following priorities: RE training & materials • Beautification of AR • Continue grassroots Nantucket/community engagement • Leadership development & training • Mission/Fall retreat • Handbook revision • Summer membership inclusion/welcome/involvement • Welcoming committee • Growing the caring committee • Stewardship

One of those priorities, the Handbook revision, has proven to be quite an undertaking, and I am grateful to Susan Richards and Paul Stewart for leading this exhaustive work.

The real power of our congregation rests with the members themselves—the installation of Rev. Linda as our minister, for example, needed a congregation vote. Our yearly budget requires a congregation vote. Our revised handbook will require a congregation vote. Meanwhile, the Board deals with ongoing, smaller issues. Some of them that we have faced in recent months include: Should pets other than service animals be allowed in the building? What rates should we set for the rental of our building and for weddings? Do we wish to encourage or discourage clapping after music during a church service? There are no right or wrong answers to any of these issues, and our discussions are often spirited and include many of your voices that we bring to the board. Through it all, I am proud to say, we remain respectful of one another, and in casting our votes, decisions are made in the best interests of the congregation, not personal preference.

One last thing: We do have a "dream list," if you will, of projects we would love to undertake, but for which we need funding. We would like to beautify the Activities Room—that busy room in the back downstairs—by replacing the carpet with something more durable and repainting the walls. We would like to replace the parsonage roof. Those old shingles don't have much life left in 'em. If any of you would like to help fund these projects, please come see me. I will be all ears.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION: A MIDSUMMER CHECK-IN

Summer is a unique time for our Religious Exploration (RE) group. For many families it's the busiest time of the year and sometimes a few weeks can go by between Sunday visits to the Meeting House. Some families are visiting the island for varying lengths of time and they may pay a Sunday Service visit or two. The summer sees first timers to our church as well as long time returnees. Our congregation welcomes you all and, of course, RE welcomes all children to our program!

To complement our varying numbers of children, we have chosen to work on a summer-long project of making our own books of the Seven Principles. We are focusing on a principle a week and children work on individual principles at their own pace. Our circle time and chalice lighting focuses on the Principle of the week and gives children a chance to think and talk about each principle before they incorporate it into creating their Principle page.

A few other things have been going on behind the scenes in RE. As the RE chair, recently I was able to attend a day-long UU training on a wonderful RE curriculum called "Spirit Play" led by the creator of the program, Dr. Nita Penfold. This is a curriculum that is geared towards a multi-age group of children and has a foundation based on the Montessori Method whose goal is to create a "peaceful community of independent children." Key to the curriculum is the storytelling format which focuses on stories that explore our Seven Principles as well as the history behind Unitarian Universalism. It was truly an inspirational day of training which I look forward to sharing with our everevolving RE program!

This summer Rev. Linda and our RE lead teacher Jen Dunbar have begun to meet regularly to discuss curriculum as well as plans for our RE group of children. We are hoping to use the Spirit Play curriculum and are also looking at ways of learning about other world religions and how they relate to our "UUness." Ideas are flowing!

As we approach September we expect another transition in our RE group as the families who have been so busy during the summer get a chance to return to our Sunday services as the busy season winds down and, of course, our summer visitors will be leaving us until next summer! In June we said goodbye to our wonderful child care assistant Blake Lazarus and we are looking forward to welcoming a new child care assistant in September. Hopefully we'll be announcing the name of that assistant very soon!

SECOND QUARTER 2014 TREASURER'S REPORT

The church's fiscal year is the calendar year. We approved our annual operating budget at the January 2014 Annual Meeting and we have been operating on that budget since then. Results for the first half of 2014 are as shown in the Report below.

I am happy to note that pledges have been increasing and total income is exceeding total expenses 'year to date' (YTD); all good financial news. Please continue to pay your pledges as the year goes along.

We have also accomplished two "special projects" this year which were outside the annual operating budget, the Hendrix Hall renovation and the new sound system. Those special projects have been partly financed by donations from individuals but mainly by grants and contributions from other organizations.

We have another project which must be attended to in the near future for which we cannot expect grants like the above. The roof on our parsonage behind the church is very worn and curling in some sections and, although it is not yet noticeably leaking, it must be attended to within the next 18 months. We have obtained estimates of between \$6,000 for a partial job to about \$25,000 for the full job including gutters. We already put aside \$4,809 for parsonage repairs in prior years. Thus we anticipate the need to raise up to an additional \$20,000 to complete this necessary capital project.
