Board of Trustees Monthly Report— October 2017

Your Board of Trustees held its monthly meeting on Monday, September 18.

Gary Langley spoke about the Food Rescue program. Over the past year Gary and Jack Weinhold have grown this program to a volunteer group of 14 who have rescued over 20,000 pounds of food which was donated to the Food Pantry and other deserving Island recipients. Gary also announced the recent receipt of a generous pledge of \$20,000 to obtain refrigerated storage for donated foods.

Lora Stewart led a further discussion of the Congregational Goals set last year:

#1. Social Justice Initiatives

#2. Lifelong Religious Exploration

#3. Communications Plan

#4. Involve members [and friends] in activities

Progress is being made on those and further specific actions have now been planned. A specific action on #4 is to hold periodic "Volunteer Fairs" during Coffee Hour to describe various activities.

A YEAR TO LIVE CLASS

How would you live if you knew you only had one year to live?

This class led by Rev. Linda Simmons lets you put this question to the test. When people do know that their lives are drawing to a close, they often experience a great deal of personal and spiritual growth. In this class, we will face mortality with intentional preparation, and live one year consciously, to the fullest. Class topics will include: Forgiveness, making peace with our lives, writing an ethical will (or legacy letter, which is a way to share our values, blessings, life's lessons), exploring our concepts of death and those from religions around the world, culminating in a "celebration of life" for all participants. Class will meet the first Wednesday of every month from 10:30-12:00pm for one year at the UU Meeting House: Oct 4, Nov 1, Dec 6, Jan 3, (no class Feb 7), March 7, April 4, May 2, June 6, second Wednesday due to Holiday July 11, August 1, Sept 5.

Docenting Review 2017

This past summer was one of the busiest in recent memory. For the most part the weather was excellent throughout July and August which usually doesn't translate well for great numbers of visitors to the sanctuary. In July we greeted 484 with another 408 in August for a total of 892 visitors for the summer, only 84 less than last year. They came from all over the world, including some 20 foreign countries with Canada and the UK leading the way.

This season we welcomed Ezra Descarfino to our team and Cheryl Creighton was back for her second year. Also returning this summer were veterans Linda & Craig Spery, Jack Weinhold, Libby Oldham, Gary Langley, Paul Stewart, Christine Sanford, Trish Jarrell and Susan & Peter Richards.

We filled three 2-hour shifts from 10am to 4pm weekdays and two shifts from 10am to 2pm on Saturdays. We counted \$414.79 in cash donations from visitors throughout the two months. That money is designated to the South Church Preservation Fund.

We look forward to next summer and hope to attract more new members to our docent team. As Christine said when we were looking for someone to fill an extra shift one week, "I'll take it — I just love sitting in the sanctuary!"

It really is a very pleasant experience meeting new people who truly love our meeting house! Please consider joining our team!

November 4th-5th: Mark your calendars for an exciting mid-Fall weekend with Rev. Dr. LoraKim as she offers us and the greater Nantucket community a full day workshop on Saturday, a bird walk late Saturday afternoon and a sure-to-be inspirational sermon at Sunday's service.

LoraKim currently lives in White Plains, New Jersey and is a UU



multi-species minister, a wildlife veterinarian, a certified trainer in nonviolent communication, and Co-Director of the organization, One Earth. She states that her goal is to "foster compassionate communication in our communities of mixed species so that all beings may flourish."

Saturday's workshop/retreat is part of One Earth Conservation's Nurture Nature Program which aims to inspire, motivate, educate, and support people to take care of themselves, their organizations, other individuals of all species by developing their awareness and understanding of nature, especially human nature as it relates to all of nature. Workshop is scheduled for 9-2:30pm and will include lunch for all participants.



Wild Bird Walk: A chance to get outside, weather as always, permitting! LoraKim has led bird walks all over the country and will lead us in some guided reflections as well as in observing the nature and birds around us. Scheduled for 4pm - sunset on Saturday.

Sunday's service theme will be "Reverence for Life" : Rev. Dr. Joyner will be speaking about Albert Schweitzer, physician, theologian, musician, and philosopher, who gave to the world the Reverence for Life Ethic. More than anything his life was his argument. How can we live like he did,

with deep reverence for all of life in ways that nurture and save ourselves, as we save the world. Come join one another as we reflect upon this, and what it means to be human in a multispecies world.

October 8: "Humanism, Being Good & Where We Go From Here" - Rev. Linda Simmons

Why is it so hard to be good people sometimes? Do you feel that our culture encourages us to live ethically or unethically? This sermon will look at some of the greats, past and present, who have lived good lives and ask how we can live our lives with a stronger moral compass in a time when true North often feels lost.

October 15: "The Art of Meaning" - Guest Speaker Rev. Kimberley Debus

Art has power to move us and change our lives. But what is it about the arts? We'll examine the ways viewing, performing, and making art helps us make sense of our lives, our communities, and all of creation. (Kimberley Debus works as a community minister in the Albany, NY area, inspiring congregations to more artful and art-filled worship, congregational life, and public witness. She has previously served the First Universalist Church of Southold on Long Island and One Island Family UU Congregation in Key West. She will be serving us for two months during Rev. Linda's spring sabbatical.)
