# Common Pathways by Rev. Linda Simmons

#### Yarn and Baseball

I joined a Meeting House knitting group recently. More than half a dozen of us got together to knit prayer shawls for folks who might need some warmth and well wishes. The knitting needles were clacking and our jaws chomping on all the lovely food set out and in the background, the World Series was playing and the Sox were working their way toward losing the game.

When you bring that many knitting women with a goal together, magic happens. There is something about having one's hands and eyes so occupied while sitting in the configuration of a conversation circle. The talking is different than it would be if row after row of knitted yarn were not cascading off of needles. We spoke of our pasts, our family's past, our joys and heartbreaks. The tones were hushed, personal, inward.

This ambiance was only broken by the action on the screen. Every several minutes, one of the woman entreated, "Turn it up" and there would be shouts of joy or mourns of disappointment that would emanate from the otherwise serene knitting crowd.

I do not know anything about baseball. I have never watched a game in my life. Admitting this was as close as I have come in my ministry to saying something heretical. My lack of knowledge is profound and my questions reflected this: Is that a weather box in the upper left corner of the screen; how can it be 93 degrees? What do they keep in the bullpen? Does Touch 'Em All involve anything immoral?

They answered my questions (the question they were too polite to voice: how could a grown woman get this far and know so little about baseball, lingered in the air like the little white ball flying across the field) and kept their own remarks running: There goes so and so, always called by a pet name. He's so fast, good, light on his feet, funny, he always lifts his hands to his dead mother when

he makes a homerun, and he just went through surgery...I felt as if I were listening to stories of the young men they went to prom with in high school.

It struck me then that baseball is about so much more than a little white ball and skinny little bats and knickers. It's about community, about connection and home. The Red Sox gather up whole lives in their games ("My mother used to listen to the Red Sox and iron..."). Their winning is proof that we go on, that time does not gobble up the past but only stretches it out, makes it elastic and permeable so we can find and refind ourselves and all that we have ever loved with each arch of the bat, each curve of the pitch, each long flying ball to the bleachers.

We must have stayed with our knitting needles, yarn, stories and baseball for four hours. The moon was low in the sky when we left. Driving home, I thought that this is what I hope for the Meeting House, this possibility of going on and on, gathering our lives up as it goes and reflecting all that we love back to us, giving us the strength to cheer when there is beauty and success and mourn when there is loss and disappointment, all the while knowing there will be another game, another shot at making it right, another reason to jump up and celebrate just around the corner.

Someone told me today that if the Sox win, the whole winter will be okay, no matter what happens. I think I am undergoing a conversion experience.

Nantucket is full of common pathways, some known by many, others known only by a few. Our Meeting House brings us together, traveling over many pathways, some common, some not, as we learn to walk with each other even when the ways are unfamiliar and unmarked

For the past ten months your Board of Trustees has met twice each month to attend to the business of the church, making decisions regarding administrative, programming and financial matters in the best interest of all. While each board meeting agenda varies, we have remained focused on the goals which we set forth in our organizational retreat held in early 2013. Here are the goals and where we stand on each initiative:

(1) Parting with the Interim Minister – Transition of leadership can be a tricky process if not handled properly and we knew that we wanted Rev. Horst and his family to have as seamless a departure as possible as they left the island after a successful interim ministry with us.

Lots of puzzle pieces had to be put into place to make it all work but we did it, thanks to the cooperation and contributions of everyone in the congregation. We gave the Horsts a great send-off in appreciation for all they had done for us during their time with us.

(2) Welcoming and Settling the New Minister – Our dedicated Search Committee braved winter storms and high seas in pursuit of a new settled minister early in the year. Their hard work certainly paid off and today we celebrate Rev. Linda Simmons as our new minister.

A bucket brigade of congregants handled the task of moving the Simmons-Langley belongings into the parsonage after Bob Lehman and other members of the Building & Grounds committee worked their magic. We have welcomed our new minister and family with open arms!

(3) Re-establishing the Membership, Music and Worship Committees – Mary Beth Splaine stepped up to head the membership committee and has done an awesome job of welcoming and orienting our newest members since year-end 2013 in cooperation with Rev. Simmons.

Music director Diane Lehman has engaged a dynamic music committee—Cynthia Csabay. Al Fuller and Karin Gockel—who played a major role in the success of the summer concert series and advising Diane on the overall music program for the Meeting House.

Rev. Simmons is in the process of activating a new Sunday Service committee to provide advice and support in Sunday services. It's all good!

(4) Promoting and Sustaining the "Music at the Meeting House Program" – Diane Lehman led her music committee in planning and implementing an outstanding music program during the summer and fall seasons.

New talent was introduced to the congregation and community and the program received grant funding from both the M.S. Worthington Foundation and ReMain Nantucket. Kudos to Diane and the music committee for all their hard work to make the program a success.

(5) Expanding the Children's Religious Exploration Program – Most recently the Religious Exploration committee, led by chair Susan Richards, named Jen Dunbar as new lead teacher supported by volunteer teachers Susan Richards, Casey Boukus, Sissy Girard, Linda Spery, Becky Hudson and John Rivera.

The UUA "Tapestry of Faith" curriculum has been adopted by the RE program, with tailoring of the program's units for each Sunday as needed to fit the needs of the group.

An RE workshop was held in October led by Harvard Divinity School student Schuyler Vogel, an experienced RE educator, who provided invaluable information to the program's teachers.

Additionally, discussions have commenced regarding the OWL (Our Whole Lives) program. Rev. Simmons is currently looking for someone to co-lead the course with her in 2014.

Finally, the youth program participants from the past year have been invited by Rev. Simmons to join in community-wide youth church programs, the first being one organized by the St. Paul's congregation this fall.

- (6) Initiating an Adult Religious Exploration Program Beginning in 2014, Rev. Simmons will be teaching her first adult religious exploration class on Nantucket in world religions. An experienced adult religious educator, Rev. Simmons looks forward to leading a number of adult education program designed to address the needs of the congregation as well as the community-at-large.
- (7) Increasing Participation and Giving Levels in the Members Fund At this point in time, we are optimistic that all members and friends of the congregation are recognizing the importance of their financial obligations to the church in order for the programs they cherish to be carried out during the coming year.

## An Historical Time by Linda Spery

A special milestone in the history of the congregation was celebrated on Sunday, October 6 as Reverend Linda Simmons was installed as our settled minister, following the path of the church's very first minister Seth Freeman Swift over 200 years ago and those who succeeded him.

The act of installation formalizes the call of Rev. Simmons to our congregation and represents the intent of our UU community to support this shared ministry and holds both the minister and congregation accountable to UU values, ethical conduct and highest aspirations.

Joining us for the installation service were a number of clergy and colleagues of Rev. Simmons from the Boston area as our special guests. Rev. Diane Miller, minister of the First Religious Society of Carlisle, offered the charge to the congregation; Rev. Elizabeth Nguyen, a colleague of Rev. Simmons from Harvard Divinity School, offered the charge to the minister; and another Harvard colleague Schuyler Vogel voiced the prayer.

Other Harvard colleagues Rev. Jennifer Channin and David Ruffin performed two beautiful pieces of music; Rev. Sue Phillips delivered the sermon and Rev. Bill Zelazny, UUA district executive from the Ballou Channing District, offered the right hand of fellowship to Rev. Simmons. The opening music for the service was performed on djembe drum by Gary Langley.

Before it became "Veterans Day" in 1954, this day used to be known as "Armistice Day" - a holiday "to be dedicated to the cause of world peace." The first Armistice Day was November 11, 1918 when World War I (the "war to end wars") ended. Millions had been killed or wounded, and bells were rung everywhere at 11:00 a.m. on November 11 for many years (11/11 at 11).

#### Our first Minister

(excerpted from Libby Oldham's Brief History)

In 1810 the proprietors called Seth Freeman Swift to be first minister. Twenty-one years old and only a few months out of Harvard, Swift rose to the occasion by providing full authority. He also initiated what were considered by some to be radical innovations: a lending library in 1815 and the island's first Sunday school three years later. Swift's commitment to the ideal of justice seems to have included justice for all races, a controversial notion in 1810

The number of blacks who came to South Church to be married suggests more than proximity. Swift officiated at the marriages of several members of the family of Captain Absalom Boston, the commander of a whaling vessel, the Industry, which sailed with an all-black crew in 1822.

November 9, 1809, the Meeting House is dedicated.

During my installation, so many of you blessed me with your words, songs, and presence. I can hardly express what it meant to me to see you all there, hear your words of encouragement and inspiration, and feel your hopes mingle with mine as we walk toward the future together. My heart was filled with gratitude. I felt honored, privileged, and blessed. Thank you, Linda
