Common Pathways: A Year to Live

Some of us from our UU Meeting House and the larger island community have been meeting once a month for this past year to take on the premise that we have one year to live. It has been a dauting task that we have each grappled with in our ways, in our own time. The premise of the class was that when we can come to terms with death, we can make room for life to be more precious.

Many of the questions to we asked and worked to answer concerned our grief at leaving this precious life, our worries about remaining vital until we die, and our concerns about others and how they will cope after we die.

The question that came most clearly to me is this one: What is it that gives us the resilience to age well, to face our deaths with acceptance and strength? As we lose our capacity to be the persons we know ourselves to be in the world, from what well do we draw from to reconstruct another identity that feels meaningful?

Our culture does not train us well for aging. We are left without a sense of well-defined meaning or purpose as we age that makes aging with dignity and hope trying at best.

I think of our small island and how blessed we are here to be able to offer one another a sense of purpose and meaning by being credible witnesses in one another's lives. When we see and hear one another well, there is always a way to make room for another's way of making meaning, another's needs, another's changing identity. As we stop

Board of Trustees Report

This summer has been a busy one for the Board of Trustees.

At our June 19 meeting, we approved the following:

- The hiring of a temporary Religious Education teacher, Katie Ponce.
- Date of August 18 for the summer Goods and Services Auction, coordinated by Board member Alison Forsgren
- Set the dates and times for the three Mission Matters gatherings, which will allow members of the congregation to give input to our new Mission Statement
- Minister's Letter of Agreement for 2018

At our July 24 meeting, we approved the following:

- A draft Mission based on the input from 3 Mission Matters gatherings
- Disposition of the George Bradburn painting, returning it to Nantucket Historical Association
- Set time and details for the August 1 summer members' gathering at the home of Jim Sulzer and Barbara Elder
- Set agenda and motions to be voted on at the August 5 Congregational Meeting

At our August 21 meeting, we approved the following:

- The continuation of Barbara Elder's contract as Music Director through the end of May, 2019
- The purchase of more 4 more headsets for the hearing-impaired, and a new microphone to for the Sanctuary
- Initiation of Church Safety Plan step 1: invite members of the Police Department to make recommendations after reviewing the physical plant
- Supporting Rev. Linda in her effort to begin a Communications Plan, using funds from both the budgeted advertising fund and the Fund to support Rev. Linda. As a first step, some members of the Board and others will meet on October 2 with a strategic planner.
- Formation of both a Pledge Solicitation and a Pledge Appreciate Committee
- Rental space in the Meeting House will not be offered at any cost for political campaign events due to putting our nonprofit status as a religious organization at risk

The Summer Congregational Meeting was held on August 5 after the service. In addition to receiving reports from Food Rescue, Make it Stop, and Immigration (3 initiatives of the 7th Principle Project), the Congregation voted to move \$20,000 from the 2017 budget surplus to the Parsonage Capital Maintenance Fund, and adopted our New Mission.

I would like to thank Vice President Susan Richards for taking over for me at the Congregational Meeting and for a couple of meetings, when I had to be off-island.


UU Docent Report 2018

As with the summer of 2017, the gorgeous weather during this July and August was a major factor in the number of people visiting our sanctuary. It seemed as though every day was sunny, hot and very humid. Most people must have been out on the water or at the edge of it. The total for July 16-August 31 (plus 2 days in September) was 358. In 2017 we had nearly 900 visitors (484/408) over the two months, and even that number was down from 2016 because of great weather throughout most of last summer as well.

A Generous Memorial Gift

Several weeks ago, I had the pleasure of meeting with Dr. Martha Hanner when she was a featured speaker at the Maria Mitchell Association (mariamitchell.org/press-releasedr-martha-hanner-15146). Dr. Hanner drew my attention to the framed embroidery in Hendrix Hall, and especially to Rev. James Z. Hanner, 1940. She has since made a generous memorial gift as detailed in her letter, which reads:

"This gift is in memory of my late husband, James Wolcott Hanner (Jim) son of the Reverend James Z. Hanner, minister from 1940 to 1942, when he left to join the Army as a Chaplain during WWII. After the War, the family bought a home on Fair Street and my husband spent many summers there during his growing up years. All his life, Jim loved music, loved the UU Society, and loved Nantucket. I would like to designate my gift for support of the music program at

Second Congregational Meeting House, including the organ, choir music, sponsoring special concerts, or other aspects of the music program."

We have received this gift and it's now available to support our Music Program as above. Our Music Director, Barbara Elder, will direct its use. You will see a new entry, 'Hanner Memorial Music,' on our quarterly Funds report, with a starting balance of \$5,214.
