### COMMON PATHWAYS

There is a labyrinth at Mepkin Abbey, the Trappist Monastery in South Carolina where Gary and I spent two weeks in February. It is cut from a field of tall grasses, now burnt yellow by the sun. Summer brings flowers that line the path with purples, yellows, blues. February sees no such color but spring begins to dance in the minds of labyrinth travelers, splashing imagined color on the winter earth.

A labyrinth is an ancient symbol that relates to wholeness. It combines the imagery of the circle and the spiral into a meandering path. The labyrinth has long been used as a mediation and prayer tool. A labyrinth has only one path. It is unicursal. The way in is the way out.

Aware of each foot I set on the earth as I grew ever closer to the center, so visible due to the thin winter vegetation, I could not still the anticipation of arriving in the blessing of that circular orb. Four small weathered stools placed in each of the four directions sat waiting on their carved wooden legs, ready to gird each traveler's desire.

One of the monks at the Abbey that has been there 59 years, since he was 17 years old, told me that when we succeed in emptying ourselves and come to nothing, we touch the ground of being and realize there is only one life, one belonging and that we and all things are part of it. How can one come to nothing, I implored? Contemplative practice, he answered, that invites us to let go over and over again and so empty a place that eternity can fill. What is eternity for the Trappists? It is love.

My feet softly padded the ground with those words. I practiced letting go of thoughts. They are so many! Thoughts judge, predict, plan, reinforce, build up and break down. The monks told me that when we can let these go, when we can let go of our attachment to who we think we are and who we think everyone else is, we can find the peace of a connection that knows no death.

For just a moment, sitting on one of those chairs in the center that held me well, I could feel eternity filling me with enough love to go on well, whole, inspired.

A part of me sits there still, in one of those chairs, each facing a different direction, welcoming the next traveler, saying, Hush now and breathe. Everything we have been or can be is enough. Hush now and know love.

\* Nantucket is full of common pathways, some known by many, others known only by a few. Our Meeting House brings us together, traveling over many pathways, some common, some not, as we learn to walk with each other even when the ways are unfamiliar and unmarked.
