COMMON PATHWAYS

Gathering and Goodness by Rev. Linda Simmons

I was at General Assembly, a gathering of Unitarian Universalists from all over the world, with many of you at the end of June. It was a whirlwind of workshops, meetings, worship, meals, conversation and reflection.

In one of the workshops, Rebecca Parker, outgoing president of Starr King School for the Ministry, told a story about communion in early Christian communities. These gatherings were not about the body and blood of Christ; they were about our bodies and our connection to each other and the holy. People gathered for a potluck kind of meal, she told us. There were some things one couldn't bring: broccoli, garlic, red meat. The exclusion of meat was to honor the sacredness of all life. We were left to wonder why broccoli and garlic were forbidden.

The communal wine was a celebration of the harvest, the fertility of seed and soil, and the symbiosis of earth and body. These early Christians were invited to dip their fingers into the cup of wine and touch their eyes, nose, ears, mouth in order to be awakened, to move beyond the flurry of everyday that numbs and disconnects. If there was a need for ritual to alleviate the numbness and disconnectedness of life in the days of early Christian, one can imagine that the need now is more urgent.

Touching the senses with the juice of grapes to remind ourselves we are human and therefore frail, interdependent, of the earth, flesh and bones, born of stardust and womb- struck me as so simple and healing- like a word of encouragement that reaches in and banishes the self-doubts we line up in a row that keep us small. Both of these uncomplicated acts remind us of our humanness and our holiness.

We were asked in this workshop if people feel loved when they enter our sanctuary on a Sunday morning. The experience of being loved is like that wine to the senses, like encouragement to doubt- something that we participate in and receive that opens us to ourselves and each other.

I have been giving the welcome on Sunday mornings from in front of the pulpit, several stairs below our beautiful and grand chancel. I do this because I want you to know I am here with you, that I am not sure of the way,

BOARD OF TRUSTEES PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

It was an honor to attend this year's inspirational General Assembly in nearby Providence, RI . . . and one of my takeaways from it was a new perspective on how we might balance our priorities in the next several months.

Congregations have so many different issues to balance and nourish. Among them are the repair and maintenance of buildings, budget and fundraising, religious exploration for children and adults, Sunday services, involvement in issues of social justice and the wider community . . . the list goes on and on. And they all require participation and good work by members of our congregation.

Our recent Summer Auction, held this June, was a shining example of service to the church at its best. Linda Spery, in another instance of her extraordinary leadership, organized a fantastic array of offerings and services, and oversaw the work of many committed volunteers to raise a substantial sum of money towards our operating budget. Thank you, Linda, for all you do.

Maintenance, repair, and beautification remain priorities at this time. The South Church Preservation Fund is about to embark on a new renovation project, which includes replacing the roof of the Meeting House. Meanwhile, the Board has been discussing two other projects: the replacement of the roof on the parsonage, and a possible "beautification project" of the Activities Room. For now, both projects are on hold, part of a "wish list," if you will. We realize that our congregation has already been stretched this year with two major, successfully completed projects: the restoration of Hendrix Hall and the new sound system.

All these projects are important, and raising money for their future implementation will be key. But I took away a different, though complementary, insight from last weekend's GA. This insight came about partly through listening to the personal stories of some truly world-class leaders such as Sister Simone Campbell (a Catholic leader in social justice) and Rev. Rebekah Montgomery (a US Army Reserve Chaplain), and also from joining in the rousing worship service led by one of Rev. Linda's friends from divinity school, David Ruffin—a "music-packed, spirit-filling worship" which involved people of all ages singing, dancing, and then marching to the river to witness "Waterfire."

The insight was simple but important: There is nothing more important than spirit, service, energy—the emotional side of why we come together as a congregation. As we attend worship services or work on committees, it is important to remember to cultivate our sense of fun (what we sometimes call our "spirit of hilarity"). We are here to be joyous, to support each other in our need, and to help make our community a better place. Let us all be open to that joy of togetherness as we move forward into our future as a congregation. And along the way, let's reach out and find others who will join us in this spirit of worship and service and fun.

Let's be part of a rising tide.

As I expected, the UU General Assembly in Providence, which quite a few of us were able to attend, was an event to remember. Just the sheer energy generated by having so many UU's together was impressive and networking opportunities were certainly plentiful! The workshops offered were wide-ranging in topics and those of us who participated from Nantucket had deliberately opted to spread ourselves out to attend as many different ones as we could.

As chairperson of our RE committee, I chose a couple of workshops with a religious education focus which turned out to be excellent presentations. Both of these workshops stressed the "landscape of change" that is impacting religious education.... that faith formation (for all ages) must go "beyond Sunday mornings".... in short there is more than one way to "do church" and while Sunday morning may work for some of us, a community potluck or working together on an outside project, presentations on a variety of topics, etc. may actually work best for others.

Both of the workshops I attended stressed the "Four Pillars of Faith Formation":

- * Covenant the way we "hold" each other
- * Content/Curriculum the education part... it doesn't happen only on Sundays! And it's not just for children!
- * Community Who are we? What do we do? Why does it matter?
- * Context/Calling Who is around you? Who could you partner and collaborate with or serve?

Needless to say, there is a lot to think about here! In future weeks and months I hope that I will be able to share some more of this with our congregation and perhaps together we can explore some new avenues of "doing church"!!

We are upgrading the cable service to the church office, including running new coaxial cable from the utility pole in front of the building. The new service will combine coverage for the main building and the parsonage, resulting in lower overall costs.

Three new low flow water saving toilets have been installed, which result in lower water usage and lower costs. The parsonage has new linoleum in the back entry and first floor bathroom. The B&G committee ripped out the old material and Island Carpet installed the beautiful new flooring last month. The historic sanctuary had a new sound system installed last month.


