Sitting with Uncertainty

My sabbatical is coming right up! On February 7th Gary and I will be flying to New Delhi, India to begin our 2 month adventure that takes us into the foothills of the Himalayas in Nepal for a 21 day trek at 10,000 feet and then on to another month in India to stay with the Unitarians of India in Shillong. What has been most pronounced about this trip planning for us has been managing the uncertainty that arises. How will my lungs do at 10,000 feet? What might be the other effects of altitude? Will we get sick from drinking water or food that we cannot tolerate? Are we strong enough to trek 3-5 hours a day at 10,000 feet? How will we manage with no indoor plumbing or running water for the 21 days during our trek? Will our two backpacks allow us enough of the right types of clothing to be comfortable? In other words, will we be able to achieve the spiritual and personal awakening that we are seeking if the bulk of these questions are not answered favorably?

Gary and I have lists and lists of things to do and gather, immunizations to get, insurances to consider purchasing. Our bedroom has piles of things to consider taking on the trip, only half of which will fit in the packs we are taking along. We wake at night dreaming thin air dreams and add new items to our lists which we forget when we return to sea level by morning.

I have been sitting with uncertainty these days, as a concept, entity, and shape. Pema Chodron, a Buddhist nun, writer and teacher, writes of uncertainty in her book <u>When Things Fall Apart:</u> "When we're on the verge of we know not what, the test of each of us is to stay on that brink and not concretize. The spiritual journey is not about heaven and finally getting to a place that's really swell."

So, I'm working with *staying on the verge* and not concretizing and while doing so, it has struck me that we may only be able to achieve the spiritual and personal awakening that we are seeking if the bulk of the questions above are not answered favorably!

I once had a teacher who said to me, "Linda, you ask questions that only the end of the journey those questions will lead you on can teach you the answers to." This is a particular disability of mine. Do you share it too? It can discourage journeying at all. Here's to the journey this New Year my friends, whatever your journey is. May it lead you deeper into the questions. And as Rainer Maria Rilke writes, "Do not now seek the answers, which cannot be given you because you would not be able to live them. And the point is, to live everything. Live the questions now. Perhaps you will then gradually, without noticing it, live along some distant day into the answer."

Happy New Year!

Board of Trustees Monthly Report— January 2017

The Board of Trustees The Board of Trustees met on December 19, 2017 and made the following actions:

- Accepted the recommendation of the Music Committee to hire Barbara Elder as summer Music Director, from June 10 to September 16, 2018. Since the "winter" position remains open, the committee recommended to the Board that Barbara Elder be appointed Interim Music Director until she assumes her summer position. Meanwhile the search will continue for a year-round Music Director. The Board unanimously approved Barbara's appointment by email vote. The Music Committee consists of Barbara Elder (chair), Gerry Mack, Val Hall, and Rev. Linda Simmons.
- Welcomed new chairperson of the Buildings and Grounds Committee, David Hall, and new committee member Angus McLeod.
- Approved the 2018 budget, to be presented to the • congregation for final approval at Annual Meeting January 28. We have not touched our endowment for at least four years, yet we have maintained a balanced budget.
- Received a report from Jack Weinhold about last year's 4th of July celebration, and heard plans for this July. Jack has some new ideas, and is asking for volunteer help.
- Reviewed the "Animals in the Meeting House" policy in the Congregational Handbook. A reworded policy will be written and voted on at the next meeting. Essentially, animals (except Service Animals) are not allowed in the Meeting House without prior approval.
- Lowered the fees for weddings which take place off-season in Hendrix Hall.
- Welcomed Allison Forsgren to the Caring Committee
- Approved two "share the plate" offerings for the Minister's Discretionary Fund.

Proposed 2018 General Operating Budget

The annual budget process we follow is laid out in our Congregational Handbook:

The Finance Committee shall develop the Church's annual budget in conjunction with the various departments and committees, within the context of the actual financial realities and longterm goals, and present a budget to the Board of Trustees for their approval by December 15, and then to the congregation two weeks prior to the annual meeting.

At its December 19th meeting your Board of Trustees voted to approve the Finance Committee's '2018 Proposed' budget shown below.

This budget is balanced, total Income (cell D9) matches total Expenses (cell D19). Some Income areas are projected to increase, and some to decrease, with a total net increase of 2%.

Increases in medical and liability insurance are reflected in Ministry and Buildings & Grounds expenses. Balancing the budget required a few painful cuts or choices not to grow further. Hopefully, the Music Program's contributions to our Sunday services will not be decreased by the slight adjustment there. However, in this budget the ACK-tion Junior Youth Group in RE has been funded only until June; we will need to find other funding to continue it in the Fall. Finally, the Contingency/Slack amount, our budget safety net, was reduced below its goal of 2% for the second year in a row.

Our Annual Congregational Meeting will be held on January 28th after service, and one of the topics will be our Annual Budget. Between now and then, I'm available to answer questions about our budget and finances in person or by e-mail.

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Rev. Linda's 2018 Sabbatical

When is Reverend Linda Away?

Rev. Linda will begin her sabbatical on February 7 and return on April 9, 2018. Her first service in the pulpit will be on April 15, 2018.

Book Discussion and Presentation

While Rev. Linda is on sabbatical our congregation and the Nantucket community are invited to read <u>The Royal Ghosts</u> by Samrat Upadhyay, available from Amazon or downloadable from the Atheneum. It is a fictional narrative featuring characters struggling with their duties to aging parents, a caste system and the complexities of arranged marriage, all against the backdrop of the Nepalese Civil War (1996-2006), a time of deep cultural transformation. Rev. Linda and Cheryl Creighton have developed a study guide and questions. Upon her return Rev. Linda will hold 3 book discussions reflecting on the complexities of Nepalese society and make a presentation about what she learned from her travels in Nepal and India.

Who Will Be our Sabbatical Minister?



Reverend Kimberley Debus, who many will remember from her visit with us in November, will be our Sabbatical Minister. Her ministry, *The Art of Meaning*, is meant to help inspire tiny revolutions that keep us focused, keep us connected, and keep us present. She works as a community minister in the Albany, NY, area and has previously served the First Universalist Church of Southold on Long Island and One Island Family UU Congregation in Key West, FL. She was choir director of the UU Congregation of Saratoga Springs, NY, and has co-created Broadway revues that explored spiritual texts through the lens of musical theater. She serves on the Worship Arts Team for the UU Annual General Assembly.

The Lay Led Service Committee will be presenting its usual 4th Sunday service.

Nepal and India Through the Eyes of a UU Minister



My sabbatical adventure will begin in India where Gary and I will explore the cave in Rishikesh where Jesus is said to have spent some time during his much contested years in India. Rishikesh, located at the mouth of the Ganges, is a sacred site in and of itself. It is also said that Lord Vishnu appeared here under a Mango tree. All alcohol and non-vegetarian food is forbidden in this city because of its sacred nature.

The theme of my sabbatical is **Northern Nepal and India through the Eyes of a UU Minister.** Recognizing that all of life is seen through the context of the viewer, I hope to spend time noticing how religion changes the lives of the people it touches, exploring the Hinduism, Buddhism and Indian Unitarianism of the people we live amongst in these two months.

After Rishikesh, we are on to Katmandu, Nepal, where the Council of Unitarians and Universalists will be meeting. There we will explore the multifaceted nature of our global faith and strive to better articulate what our shared faith is. We will hear from several keynote speakers about how we can bridge the differences of our faith expressions to become a stronger, more united voice for religious freedom in our world.

The next 21 days in Nepal will be spent on a trekking adventure in the foothills of the Himalayas arranged by Karma Sherpa, a Nepalese guide, social worker and grand thinker, whom I met at the Nantucket Project. Local guides will trek with us to small villages where we will stay in homes and visit monasteries and schools and be in touch with many people, customs, religions and rituals.

We will continue by jeep and bus into India and journey slowly down to Shillong in the Khasi Hills, just above Bangladesh, and spend the rest of our sabbatical with the Indian Unitarians and their ministers, who live in a matrilineal society. Time will be spent volunteering in a local Unitarian orphanage, the Margaret Barr Children's Village.

Throughout all of this time, my goal is to open my heart and mind to the people, religion, culture, and ways of living around me so that I might see, feel, learn and experience myself and others in way that I have not and so learn new ways of being in the world and embody more compassion and awareness. Who will handle the various ministries of the Church while she is away?

The Board of Trustees will continue to look out for the wider ministry of the congregation and the Committee on Ministry will continue to serve as the Communications Liaison to the congregation, helping ensure that the congregation understands what happens during the sabbatical.

Lucretia Voigt, Office Manager, will be the Administrative Liaison, under Board supervision.

Rev. Kimberley Debus will be the Worship Liaison, under Board supervision.
